KOKODA TREK GETTING SERIOUS NOW

Conquering the Kokoda Trail is fast becoming a reality for the five students from my electorate who will be travelling to Papua-New Guinea at the end of June as part of the Colin Sinclair Scholarship.

All five recipients are part of a program I launched this year following my trip to Kokoda last year.

When they arrive in PNG they will join 15 other regional Victorian students from similar programs being run by The Nationals in other electorates.

Recently the five Colin Sinclair recipients met at Moama RSL Club for their formal briefing about the gear they will need to take with them, their medical requirements and – most demanding of all – their training.

East Gippsland Nationals MP Tim Bull, who is a veteran of three walks with students, and will be one of the tour leaders this year, ran the briefing session, taking them through his own experiences and also providing them with the back story behind the program.

We were also able to use the night for a little recruiting of our own – Luke O'Toole, father of Swan Hill student Billy – will be going as well, making him the second father to enlist, following Rochester's Oakley Tarrant, whose father Patrick signed up weeks ago.

Harness Racing

The harness racing industry in my electorate is facing a tough future so Shadow Racing Minister, Tim Bull, and I have met with the Echuca Harness Racing Club president, Shane Gloury, and Swan Hill Trotting Club vice-president Gerry Moloney to discuss at length the well-documented challenges facing them.

I see the key to that discussion is the importance – and proud history – of harness racing in regional economies. I think while most people would agree there does need to be some reform and change to put the industry in a more secure, long-term position, a slash and burn strategy is not the answer.

There has been financial mismanagement of the highest order at Harness Racing Victoria. HRV has had combined losses of \$10.8 million in 2022 and 2023 and is facing another huge loss in 2024.

We have already made representations and advocated for our local clubs to be given the strongest possible calendars – with long-term guarantees so their industry can make plans for future investment and growth.

Grassroots clubs such as Echuca and Swan Hill have been told by HRV to expect a significant cut in the number of meetings they are allocated in the upcoming 2024/25 season and that needs to be carefully monitored.
